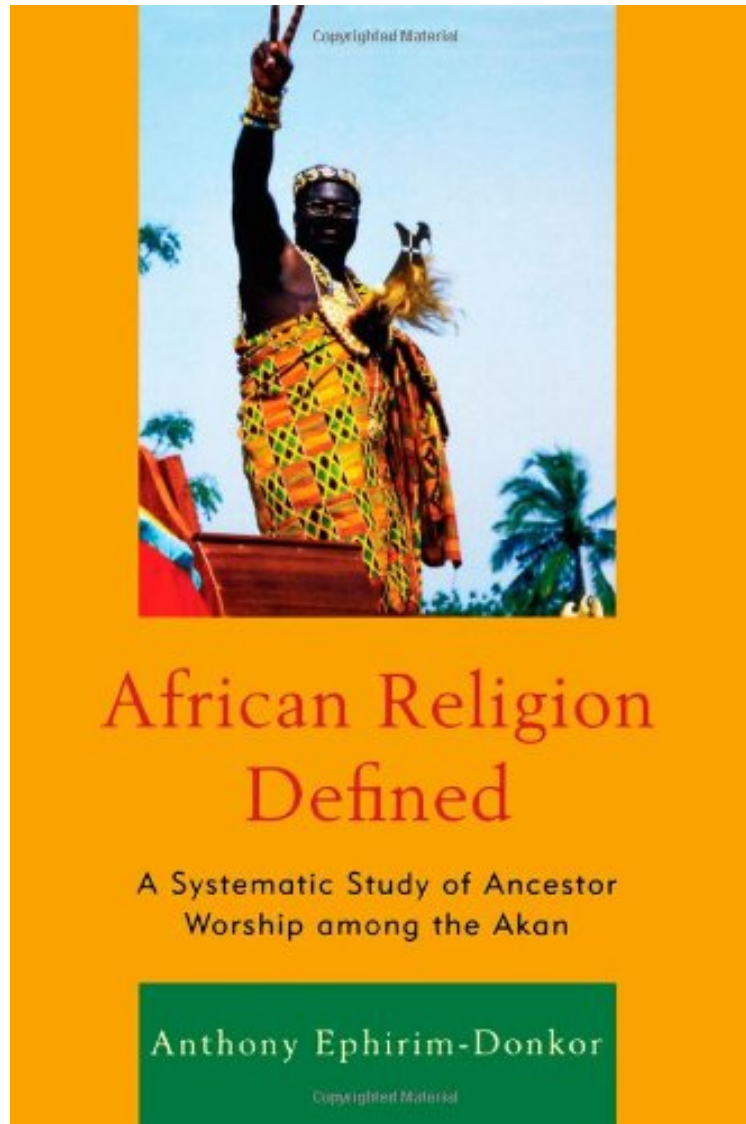

As in his other two books on the Akan people of Ghana, Dr. Ephirim-Donkor demonstrates a keen insight into the religious existence of the African people. In order to know the inner workings of the people of African descent, you really have to understand the implicit and explicit religious views that shape them. The religious life of African people, undoubtedly informs their personhood as well as the ways they view and relate to the world, both visible and invisible. I particularly enjoyed the chapters on cosmology, witchcraft, and living ancestors. If you are of African descent and interested in knowing yourself, you would want to read this book. And if you are not a person of African descent but wish to explore the religious world of African people, you would find this book helpful in that pursuit.
