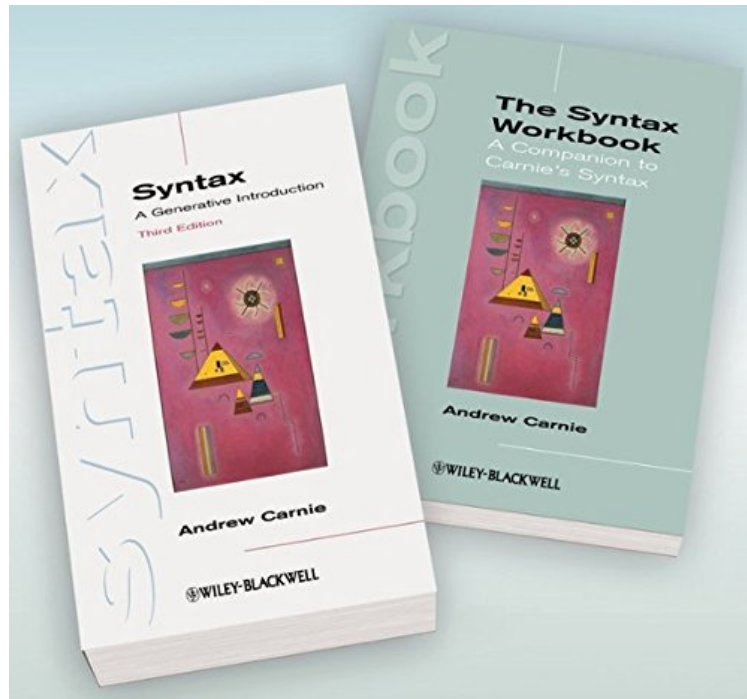


Syntax: A Generative Introduction 3rd Edition and The Syntax Workbook Set
