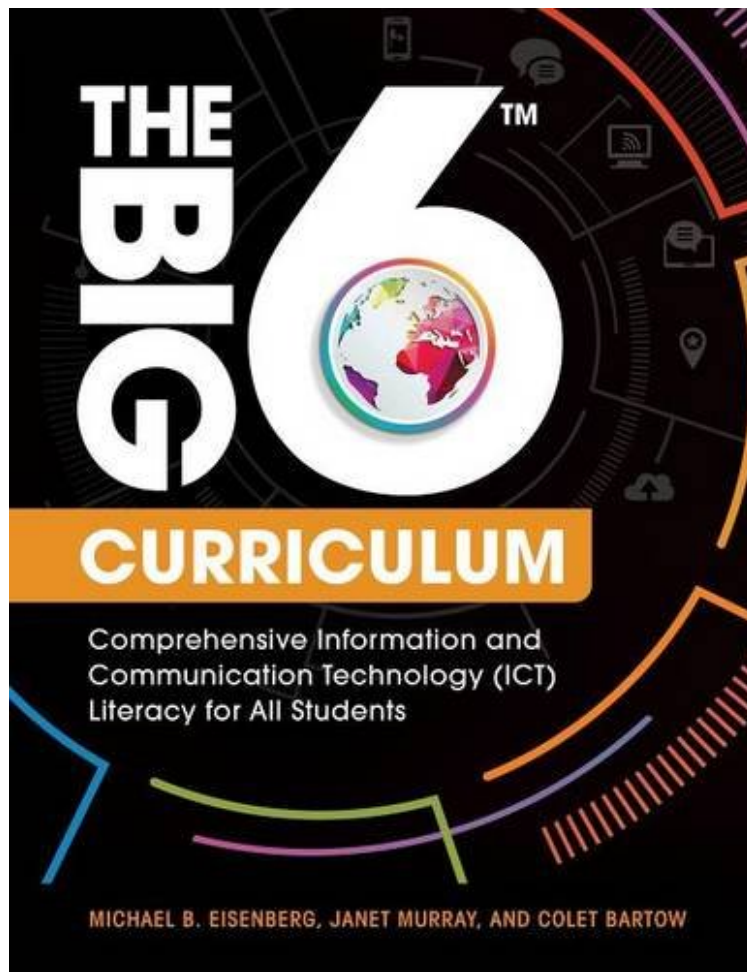

Teaching in a state that has adopted the Common Core State Standards, it becomes apparent that students are expected to have ICT skills in order to achieve the standards, but they are not explicitly taught. The Big6 curriculum to the rescue! This book

provides an overview of the Big6 (and Super3 for grades K-2), and suggests a scope sequence for teaching each of the stages in the process. Lesson ideas for each stage and ways to assess and report student progress are also presented in an organized way, along with plenty of resources. Plus, as a resource compatible with the AASL and ISTE standards, it puts everything into a manageable framework so I could be sure I was covering everything. This really helped me put structure in my instruction during the course of this past school year.
