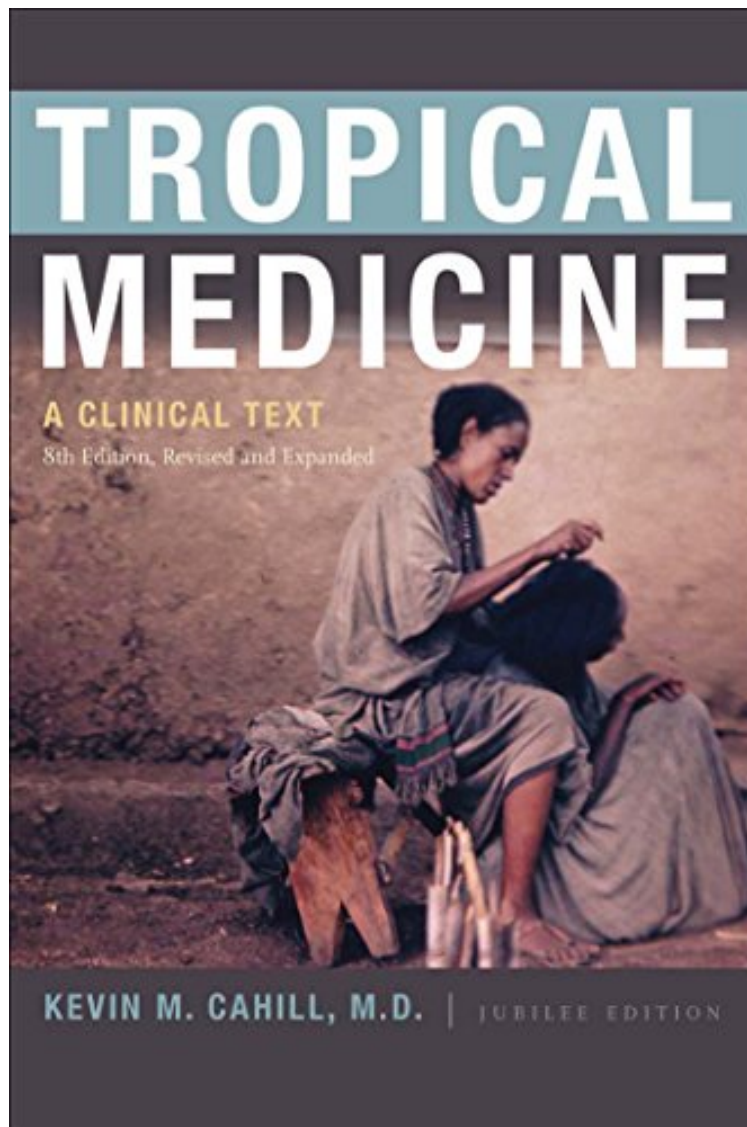

This book does a superb job of documenting the various medical hells that can befall those who enter its deadly environment for all but the briefest amount of time.
